## **General Record Book Guide Lines**

1. Your record book should begin with the date of ear tagging. Although you probably got your pig before this date, the ear tagging officially marks the beginning of the “project”. The days on feed will begin with the date of ear tagging and end with the final weigh in. If you do not know the weight of your pig at ear tagging, you should estimate it so that you have a beginning weight.
2. This record book is not a scrapbook; it is an official record of your project. Do not put your record book in a folder, binder, etc. If you add pages, staple them in place.
3. Complete all sections; double-check your math calculations. Be sure to add dollar signs and unit labels as needed. Have someone review your spelling and grammar. Always use complete sentences and proper spelling.
4. The final record book is to be hand written by the exhibitor in blue or black ink. Do not type your record book.
5. When you turn your record book in at the final weigh in, do not think of it as finished. You should record your placing as well as any premiums you earned. Also, make note from the feedback the judge gave you on your animal project as well as any comments made by the showmanship judge. This information will be helpful for future projects.
6. If these rules are not followed your record book may be disqualified from grading.
7. ESTIMATE THE FINAL WEIGHT OF YOUR SWINE AND COMPLETE YOUR RECORD BOOK BEFORE YOU COME TO THE FINAL WEIGH IN. YOUR RECORD BOOK WILL BE TURNED IN WHEN YOUR HOG CROSSES THE SCALE TO BE WEIGHED IN. IF YOU DO NOT HAVE ACCESS TO SCALES, YOU MAY USE A WEIGHT TAPE. ASK YOUR ADVISOR IF YOU HAVE A PROBLEM.
8. You will not have points deducted for a “simple and complete” record book but in case of tie breaking, the more “thorough and informational” record book will be awarded.

## **Project Terms and Explanations**

1. Date Acquired- May use Year , “current year”, “previous year”, “purchased 3 years ago” or such language as long as it is consistent throughout record and figured correctly.
2. Original Purchase Cost or Value- How much did it cost or what was it worth?
3. Value at Beginning of Project- For items purchased this year, it would be the same as “purchase cost or value”. For used items, it should be the depreciated amount from last years’ record or 10% per year subtracted from the *original* purchase cost(A).
4. Depreciation-10% of original purchase cost or value. It is an expense.
5. Value at the end of project-Value at beginning of project(B) minus depreciation(C).

An easy way to keep up with feed purchases, other expenses and daily events is to use a calendar. Hang a calendar large enough to write on it a convenient place. Take the time to write down when you increased your feed, worked your animal, administered medications, etc. Then when you sit down to organize your record book all the information your need is located together.

### Project Inventory

This record tells you what you started with and the value of your property at the end of the project. Everything has a value, even if the item was a gift or previously owned. ## Weight Record & Income Page

To monitor growth and development, keep a record of weight gain. A weight tape can be used if you do not have access to a scale. Start with your official weight from the date of ear tagging

It is important to understand that there are 2 separate ways to interpret the value of your hog at the end of your project.

1) The actual “market value” of your hog is about 40 cents per pound. This is what a hog producer would get for a hog the same size as yours. Just for your own information, figure the “market price” of your hog:

2) The “estimated show value” of your hog gives a more realistic estimation of the profit and loss of your swine project. Fill in the chart below using the estimated final weight and the \$2.75/lb figure that is provided. This is a reasonable estimation of the outcome of your project. **There is NO GUARANTEE that you will sell your hog for this amount.** It is used as a reasonable estimation only. Your income will rely solely on the bidding price per pound at auction for your hog.
